HOW YOUR MONEY IS SPENT



The Emergency Fund was put to good use and the following were assisted for the reasons stated. Assistance is given to those in distress whether they are welfare beneficiaries or not.

Rs.2000 to Mrs Wilma Ferdinands who is very ill but came from Moratuwa needing medication.

Rs.2000 to Mrs Jennifer Wijenayake who has been in hospital and needed medication.

Rs.2000 to Mrs Gladys de Zilva. 79 years old with a daughter who is mentally ill. Is on the waiting list for a regular welfare benefit.

Rs.2000 to Mrs Olivia Williams. 67 years old and needed money for medication.

Rs.2000 to Mrs Therese Plunkett. Came to Colombo to consult a specialist. Needed medication.

Rs.2000 to Miss Clare de Zilva. Has to enter hospital for an angiogram. Needed money for medication.

Rs.2000 to Mr Anton Williams. Phoned from Kurunegala as he has been very ill in hospital and needed some nourishment. Paid by money order.

Rs.2000 to Mrs Rosabelle de Silva. 76 years old and feeble. Needed money for medication.

Rs.2000 to Mr Norman Kwesius. Just out of hospital and needed money for medication.

Rs.2000 to Mr George Rezel. 67 years old. Sick and unable to work. Needed money for medication.

Entirely due to the generosity of our members, we have been able to increase the mid-year bonus paid to the welfare beneficiaries from Rs.2000 to Rs.4000! This was paid to them in mid-May and was a very welcome surprise. The increase was considered because of the very high cost of living in Sri Lanka at the present time.



On the left is ROSHAN HANSAY of Colombo. He is 31 years old, married with two children aged 4 years and six months respectively. In 2002, he was run over by a train and lost both his legs above the ankles. In time, he started working in a garment factory but found it difficult to stand because of his prostheses. These chafe and he says he is subject to 'boils'. He and his family live with his in-laws and he does some sewing to earn a few rupees. He is desperate to obtain financial assistance to support his family. He is anxious to live with them in his own little home so that he can do more tailoring and earn a decent living. Roshan has been selected to get a regular welfare benefit but has to be on the waiting list until a vacancy occurs. At the moment, we have a total of 200 welfare beneficiaries which is the most we can afford.

Welfare Beneficiaries, Ms. Barbara Manger and Ms. Grace Fonseka passed away and were replaced by Ms. Priyadarshini Ohlmus and Ms Gladys de Zilwa.

BADDAGINNIE - VICTORIA

Baddaginnie is a small town in Victoria, Australia. It is located on the Albury-Wodonga railway line, in the Rural City of Benalla, 12 kilometres south-west of Benalla itself on the old Hume highway. It is situated in mainly flat un-forested country, one kilometre west of the Baddaginnie Creek. At the 2006 census, Baddaginnie and the surrounding area had a population of 460.

Although often mistaken for an aboriginal word, Baddaginnie was the name given to the local township by Sri Lankan railway workers building the Melbourne-Sydney rail line in the 1860s. According to local legend, when provisions failed to arrive at the settlement, the Sri Lankan men named their camp 'Baddaginnie' meaning 'empty belly'. Baddaginnie really means hunger; 'Bada' is 'stomach' and 'ginnie' is 'fire'.

"Australian Places" quote: "The site for Baddaginnie was surveyed in 1857. Its name is believed to be derived from an expression learned in Ceylon by the surveyor, meaning "hungry", as the survey team was without food when it arrived at Baddaginnie". The town was surveyed in 1857 but settlement was slow, a Post Office finally opening on September 16, 1879 ^[2]

George "Joey" Palmer, the 1880s Australian test cricketer died here on 22 August 1910.

COCAINE – ADDICTIVE DRUG

(Some years ago I wrote on this same subject. It is appropriate to recap in view of the fact that drug addiction is a major health and social problem internationally.)

HISTORY: Cocaine is derived from the plant *Erythroxylon coca* which grows extensively in the Andes in South America.

From antiquity, the Peruvian Indians chewed coca leaves mixed with lime. Followers of the Inca religion believed that cocaine was a gift of Manco Cepac, the son of the Sun God. Some of the early explorers introduced coca leaves into Europe. In the 19th century Sigmund Freud conducted experiments with cocaine and, in 1884, his associate, Karl Koller, used it for the first time as a local anaesthetic.

Around that time a Corsican chemist, Angelo Mariani, combined coca leaves with wine and marketed it under the name “Vin Mariani”.

There was a mistaken belief that cocaine could cure tuberculosis and, in 1885, the famous writer, R. L. Stevenson, received this form of therapy – to no avail!

In 1886 an American, John Pemberton, produced a beverage containing cocaine derived from coca leaves and caffeine obtained from the African Kola nut. He called it “Coca Cola.” Vigorous advertising caused Coca Cola to rise dramatically in popularity. It was even featured in songs! However, the United States government recognised the danger cocaine posed to health and, in 1906, only decocainised leaves were permitted in the preparation of this drink and that decision was emulated internationally.

INTRODUCTION: Often, cocaine is called a drug of “recreational” abuse. Many millions are hooked on it, particularly in the United States. It goes under a variety of names: snow, flake, white lady, nose candy. Commonly, addicts inhale it. They place it in a spoon, adulterate it with sugar or chop it into columns on a sheet of glass and inhale it through rolled up paper. Some derive their “fix” by intravenous injection. This has the potential for serious health consequences.

EFFECTS: Although used medicinally as a local anaesthetic, the abuse of this drug is a major problem. The rate at which cocaine reaches maximum concentration in the blood is dependent on the route of entry. Injection into a vein is quickest and potentially lethal. The main effects are an increase in heart rate, an elevation in blood pressure and a sharp rise in body temperature. In severe cases of overdose, seizures may occur.

In regard to the psychological effects, eminent toxicologist, Dr. L. Haddad, states in that monumental work **CLINICAL MANAGEMENT OF POISONING AND DRUG**

OVERDOSE: “The cocaine user normally develops a depressive aftermath.....In one study, sixteen cocaine-related suicides were described

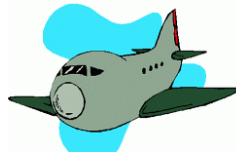
