Dutch auctions were held for very generously donated gifts e.g. Dolls and Cakes.

The Dances, support for which had climbed, entailed the engagement of professional caterers and well known Dance Bands. Committee members continued to donate prizes and cheerfully arrange, decorate and clear up afterwards. I recall being Santa Claus for a Christmas Dance at Clayton. Never again I averred. Balloon blowing was gut busting till I brought along an Electrolux with home adaptor. These were times of good fellowship for the committee.

Now that after 21 years on Committee Maureen and I have retired from Management and Fund Raising Committees, I shall always remember the happy fellowship we shared in both committees. In management we held often different views or ideas, but there was never acrimony and always eventually a consensus. Our focus was always - The Less Fortunate Burghers in S.L.
